

### Client testimonial for Proximal Suspensory Desmitis treatment

When our beloved showjumping schoolmaster went lame behind early last year we were devastated. Our vet suspected suspensory ligament desmitis and after ultrasound scanning, confirmed this to be the case.

We were told that the recommended course of action was to denerve the ligament and release the surrounding connective tissue (neurectomy and plantar fasciotomy). This seemed a very drastic solution indeed and we were very uneasy about the proposal but felt there was no alternative.

At this time it happened that a friend of ours mentioned our situation to Roger, who gave her his view on this condition, which she passed on to me. When I spoke to Roger he was confident that his methods would be able to help our horse, as they had already done for many others.

He gave me the number of another client of his with a horse which had a similar condition which he was treating so I could get her view on how Roger's treatment was helping. When I rang her she left me in no doubt that I should call him in!

We kept the horse in very light work during the treatment period, and he was able to be turned out every day throughout. After about 6 weeks we started to build his work up and he was indeed sound! It is now a year on, and we are thrilled that we came across Roger!

The total cost of the treatment was less than £500, whereas the 'estimate' for the surgical route was around £3,000.

I have to add that our usual vet was very reluctant to accept that this alternative treatment could possibly be successful and it remains a moot point between us! I would advise anyone considering using Roger's methods to expect some cynicism (at best!) from your vet!
